
Why was the Investment needed?

The investment was crucial to address longstanding health inequalities affecting marginalised members of the South Asian Pakistani diaspora. These communities often face cultural, linguistic, and systemic barriers that limit their ability to access and influence healthcare services. Without targeted support, their voices risk being overlooked in the planning and delivery of care. The Foundation already had an established network of Health Champions from the diaspora in North Manchester. However, to truly mobilise these networks and translate community insights into action, further investment was essential. The funding enabled the Foundation to engage residents more effectively, gather meaningful feedback on healthcare needs, and identify the specific barriers they face in accessing services.

This investment specifically strengthened collaboration with the Manchester University NHS Foundation Trust, ensuring that the service design of their new Community Diagnostic Centre was better informed by community input. Additionally, it supported the production of bilingual educational videos, which played a critical role in raising awareness and improving access to consultation events tools that would not have been possible without financial backing.

In short, the investment was needed not only to amplify the voices of an underrepresented community but also to turn their input into tangible improvements in local health services.

Impact

By actively involving service users and dedicated Health Champions, The Foundation has uncovered critical barriers to healthcare access and collaborated with stakeholders to remove them. This grassroots-led approach has not only informed service improvements but has also fostered trust between communities and healthcare providers. A cornerstone of the project's success has been the creation of bi-lingual educational videos tools that have significantly boosted health literacy, challenged harmful myths, and encouraged feedback that directly informs the design of more responsive services at the new community diagnostic centres. Working alongside key partners such as Manchester University NHS Foundation Trust, the project continues to empower communities and shape services that reflect cultural realities. The result: more inclusive, accessible healthcare and, most importantly, better health outcomes for South Asian residents across the region.

Outcomes



O of service users (via Health Champions) indicate an increase in the quality and responsiveness of CDC services after the feedback was implemented



55% of Health Champions and service users of CDC identify reduced barriers in accessing healthcare services, such as improved translation services, more convenient appointment times, better bilingual support

These outcomes demonstrate the positive and measurable impact of consultation, co-design in health care system planning. The programme ultimately improved access to healthcare, raised awareness of health issues, all while actively involving the Pakistani community in shaping the services that affect them.

What worked well?

Strong engagement with Health Champions to cascade messages and convene consultation groups.

Bi-lingual educational videos effectively raised health awareness.

The Foundation's established network enabled quick adaptation to needs.

Increased trust within the community boosted participation in health programmes.

What we learnt?

Increase the frequency of feedback sessions for more timely insights.

Enhance accessibility of materials for those with low digital literacy.

How has the investment positively impacted community cohesion

The investment has positively affected community cohesion by empowering local Health Champions and our service users. fostering a sense of ownership and pride in improving health services. It has created spaces for open dialogue between the community and service providers, building trust and collaboration. By raising awareness through culturally relevant content, the project has helped bridge gaps in understanding and engagement, ensuring that health messages resonate with the community. Additionally, it has encouraged collective participation in health initiatives, fostering solidarity and a shared sense of responsibility for one another's well-being. Ultimately, the investment has strengthened connections among diverse community members, addressing their shared health concerns and needs.

Legacy

The legacy of the Foundation's project will be a more empowered and resilient community in North Manchester, particularly within the Pakistani population. By establishing a strong network of Health Champions, the project has created a sustainable framework for ongoing community engagement and advocacy, ensuring that local voices continue to influence healthcare delivery. The culturally tailored educational content produced will remain a valuable resource, improving health literacy for years to come. Additionally, the strengthened partnerships with local health services will continue to benefit the community, creating a lasting impact on access to healthcare and overall health outcomes. The Foundation's work will leave behind a model for community-led health initiatives, fostering long-term collaboration and trust between the Pakistani community and service providers.

Case Study

Amina, a 68-year-old Pakistani woman, lives in the Crumpsall area of North Manchester. She has faced numerous challenges in accessing healthcare services due to language barriers, limited digital literacy and a lack of culturally relevant health information. Amina is a member of Flowhesion's a local Health Champion group in North Manchester. She contributed her thoughts on service delivery and design as part of this programme. She has more recently utilised the Community Diagnostic centre in North Manchester for Ophthalmology and Respiratory diagnostics testing
